

The Rome Convention Center – La Nuvola – combines design, technology, and sustainability in 58,500 m² of flexible spaces and 8.000 seats at the heart of modern Rome.

Designed by Massimiliano Fuksas, one of the most renowned contemporary architects, the Rome Convention Center - La Nuvola - is an international work that is of strategic importance for both the city and the Country. It features extreme flexibility, the ability to host events with widely differing characteristics, an

overall capacity of 8,000 seats and an eco-friendly approach. Standing within a context that is dominated by the architectural rationalism of the 'Thirties and 'Forties, it boasts technologically advanced ways of creating harmonic, fluid spaces, suitable for people who are permanently on the move and constantly intercon-

Just a few kilometres from airports and railway stations, with which it is well connected by an extensive local transport system, the complex stands just 5 underground railway stops from Rome's historic centre, in a district that offers the widest possible range of overnight accommodaall within easy reach on foot.
