Young Scientist and Trainee Poster Awards

UEEMS will grant a Trainee Poster Award of Euro 500 and MPT (Hungarian Society of Psychiatry) will grant a Young Scientist Poster Award of Euro 500 to the two most outstanding posters of the Conference.

Donald J. Cohen Fellowship Program

The Donald J. Cohen Fellowship Program is organised to support the professional development of highly promising young psychiatrists from across Europe. The Program will consist of 3 afternoon small-group work meetings during which fellows will discuss their research projects and career directions. Co-led by pre-eminent leaders in the field, these small-group meetings will be complemented by an opening orientation session, a didactic seminar, social events, and a closing symposium. Fellows' Conference registration, lodging and travel expenses are supported by an unrestricted educational grant from Eli Lilly.

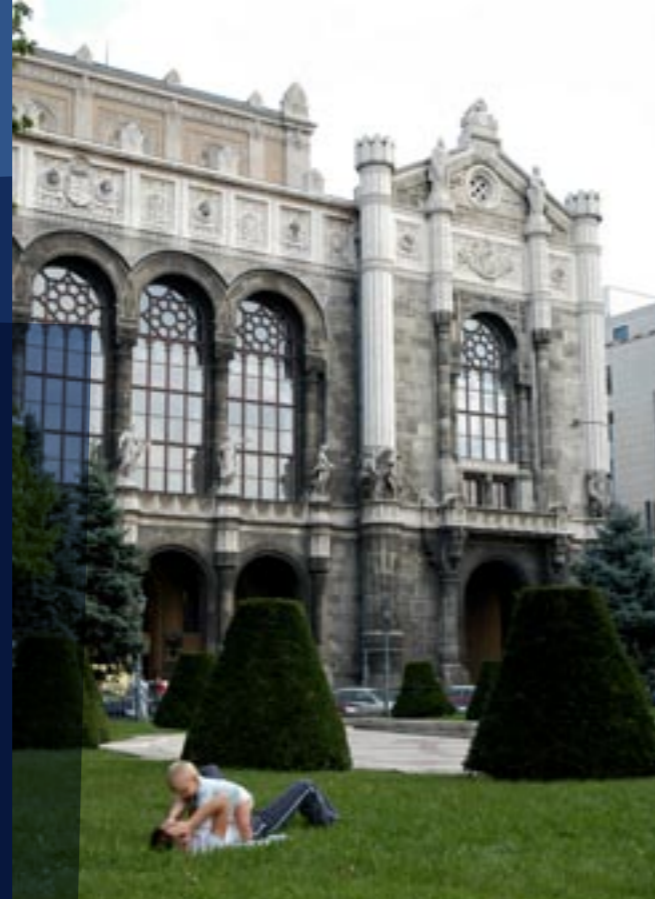
